	Reading aims		Genre: Traditional tales. The Gingerbread Man The 3 Little Pigs Little Red Riding Hood Nativity Story <u>Reading:</u> Year 1: Phonics – ELS Phase 5a. Read unfamiliar words by blending sounds together. Read some common exception words. Reception: Phonics - ELS Phase 2. Blend sounds into words to read short words. Begin to read a few common exception words.
	Writing aims		Year 1: Saying out loud what they are going to write about. Compose a sentence orally before writing it. Begin to write more than one sentence. Reread what they have written to check it makes sense. Use spaces between words. Creating story maps, writing labels and captions. Begin to recount events. Punctuation and Grammar: Identify nouns, adjectives and verbs. Introduce conjunction 'and' Introduce question and exclamation marks. Reception: begin to spell words by identifying the sounds and then writing the sounds with letters. Begin to form lower-case correctly.
